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CASTLE RING

If we had travelled back in time to 50AD at the same time as taking Year 11 to visit Castle Ring on the edge of Cannock Chase, we may have been able to see a peaceful and perhaps bustling Iron Age Hill fort being used for growing crops, farming sheep and going about daily life. On the day we went time travel was not possible so it was up to Year 11 to imagine how the site had looked nearly 2000 years earlier.

They used their excellent skills to analyse the evidence that they could see and work out how that would have been different in the Iron Age. During the visit they spotted the remains of the original defences around the hillfort, the extra added features of foundations to a Medieval hunting lodge, an 18th century path and they successfully re enacted the attacking of the hillfort as it would have taken place by the Romans when they arrived in Britain.

Although the mud and wind on Cannock Chase made this the least glamorous trip we have ever been on, our Year 11 history group made it the most imaginative and hilarious experience and they clearly realised their own ability to be amazing archaeologists and fantastic Celtic warriors!


Both are going onto new adventures, mainly outside of Education, and we wish them the very best in their futures. Good luck from us all at Albright – keep in touch!

We started off by looking around the interiors of some of the Rock Houses, learning about how people would have lived there right up until the 1960s. Looking around the houses gave pupils chance to understand what life might have been like for the men, women and children who called the Rock Houses home.

It was then time for a walk up the hill to see the remains of the Bronze Age fort, hearing about the trading that the fort inhabitants would have conducted with other local settlements. Not only did pupils get chance to see and hear about this history, but also to learn about the conservation work being done by the National Trust in the area.
